Re-Imagining Congo House/African Institute Paintings Project

The **Re-Imagining Congo House/African Institute** project worked with people from North Wales and Central Africa to tell the story of Colwyn Bay's African Institute. The Institute opened in Colwyn Bay in 1889 by Rev. William Hughes and offered Black, primarily African, students training in various skills and trades. It closed in 1912. Many of these students went on to further study at British universities, returning to Africa as doctors, teachers, nurses and journalists.

Mfikela Jean Samuel is a Cameroonian North Wales-based artist. Supported by heritage consultant Dr Marian Gwyn and Rachel Evans from Conwy Museum Service, he led Year 8 pupils at Ysgol Bryn Elian to produce paintings exploring the story of the African Institute. The artworks were displayed at Colwyn Bay Library in 2024 alongside wooden clubs carried by students of the Institute on their journey to Colwyn Bay.
